

Cold front may bring some rain

The first cool front of the season will dip into the Sunshine State this weekend, but it will mean rain, not chilly temperatures for South Florida.

The National Weather Service has backed off forecasts for higher rain chances this week as a stubborn high-pressure system refuses to budge.

But a cool front expected to dip into the state early next week could mean an increase in showers.

Cooler temperatures, however, are still a few weeks away.

Chuck Caracozza, a NWS meteorologist in Miami, said weather prediction models disagree on how far the front will dip into Florida, with the

Euro stalling the front out over Lake Okechobee and the American GFS model stalling it out over North Florida.

The deeper the dip, the higher the rain chances for South Florida.

"How far it moves will affect the coverage of showers and thunderstorms early next week," Caracozza said. "Mainly, this would be a rain thing. It doesn't look like it would be a clear path through, which is typical for early season fronts."

More fall-like temperatures begin in late October and early November for South Florida.

West Palm Beach's first day with a high of 80 degrees happens, on average, on Nov. 13, with overnight lows dipping below 70 for the first

time on Oct. 27.

Forecasters had expected an area of high pressure to begin to move away this weekend, increasing shower chances.

Now, it's possible that high pressure will stick around and work in conjunction with an area of low pressure in the Gulf of Mexico to bring in drier air, Caracozza said.

Rain chances Wednesday and Thursday are just 20 percent in West Palm Beach. That increases to between 30 and 40 percent through Sunday.

The rain may be welcome to some areas of South Florida where September ended as the driest on record. West Palm Beach, Naples and Fort Lauderdale all had record low rainfall last

month.

Florida climatologist David Zierden wrote in a social media post that the best news he's heard in a while was an increase in rain chances for Tallahassee with the cool front.

Tallahassee got no measurable rain in September. The high temperature in Tallahassee on Monday was 95 degrees. That's a full 10 degrees above normal.

Daytime temperatures in West Palm Beach will peak in the mid-to-high 80s through the weekend with lows in the mid-70s.

The normal daytime high for this time of year is 87, with an overnight normal of 74.

Norton celebrates Latinx culture with exhibit, community day

The Norton Museum in West Palm Beach will launch its new initiative to draw attention to the contributions of Latin American artists with the opening Friday of "The Body Says, I Am a Fiesta: The Figure in Latin American Art."

The exhibition, drawn mainly from the museum's collection, will explore artists' representations of the body as a universal aspect of humanity and a means of communicating ideas ranging from the political to the sacred.

The show will include works by the famous Mexican muralists Diego Rivera, Jose Clemente Orozco and David Alfaro Siqueiros as well as artists such as Rufino Tamayo, Ana Mendicita, Felix Gonzalez-Torres, Vik Muniz and Pavel

This week's Art After Dark, scheduled for 5 to 10 p.m. Friday, will take its cue from the exhibition, with a conversation by curator J. Rachel Gustafson and performances by the Latin jazz ensemble Negroni's Trio and Ballet Arts Dance Company.

From noon to 5 p.m. Saturday, the Norton will hold its first Latinx

Community Day, a free event packed with activities. They will include tours in Spanish and English, the eclectic music of Kuyayky and Pepe Montes y Su Conjunto, and a dance performance by Esencia de Boriken accompanied by the percussion ensemble Pedro Vilanova and Tamborica Miami. Family art activities and screenings of short documentaries about



Kuyayky, which specializes in Andean music blended with Mexican zandunga and Afro-Peruvian lardo styles, will perform at noon Saturday during the Norton Museum's first Latinx Community Day. [COURTESY] KUYAYKY

topics such as water rights, entrepreneurial analyses of the crisis in Puerto Rico and immigration also are planned.
