Leilah Babirye

Leilah Babirye's (b. Uganda, 1985) multidisciplinary practice transforms everyday materials into objects that address issues surrounding identity, sexuality, and human rights. The artist frequently uses traditional African masks to explore the diversity of LGBTQI identities, assembling them from ceramics, metal and hand-carved wood; lustrous, painterly glazes are juxtaposed with chiseled, roughly-textured woodwork and metal objects associated with the art of blacksmithing. Her work can be found in public collections worldwide.

Ruth Duckworth (b. Germany, 1919 – 2009) is best known as a modernist sculptor who made handbuilt, minimalist, abstract organic forms in stoneware, porcelain, and later bronze. Duckworth's work helped shape a new way of thinking about ceramics in the second half of the 20th century and created a place for clay as a sculptural medium at a time when it was viewed more so as a material of utility and function. Her works are in the collections of the Smithsonian American Art Museum in Washington, D.C., the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York, the Philadelphia Museum of Art, and the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, among others.

Viola Frey

Over the course of her five-decade career, Viola Frey (b. California, 1933–2004) created boldly colored monumental figurative sculptures, paintings, and works on paper that reflect on contemporary culture, power, and gender dynamics. While most closely aligned with the Bay Area Funk movement, Frey's immense creative output delves into many aesthetic directions, using a distinctive and personal iconography and palette to depict human figures among objects of antiquity, flea market collectibles, and interior landscapes. Frey's work is held in over seventy international public collections and has been the subject of numerous global exhibitions.

Katharina Fritsch

Katharina Fritsch (b. Germany, 1956) is a contemporary German sculptor whose work mixes reality with imagination to create surreal imagery that contract reality and fantasy through her largescale monochromatic sculptures of animals, people, and objects. Fritsch's work is often described as uncanny, containing slight representational shifts that alter the viewer's perception of reality and highlighting the work's falsified imitation of life. Fritsch's work is included in the permanent collection of The Museum of Modern Art in New York and has been the subject of many solo international exhibitions.

Rachel Lee Hovnanian

Rachel Lee Hovnanian (b. West Virginia, 1959) is a New York and Miami-based artist whose multidisciplinary practice explores the complexities of modern feminism, cultural ideals regarding physical perfection, and the psychological effects of new media and technology. She has exhibited internationally in solo exhibitions at the Joyce Gallery in Beijing and Fundación Pons in Barcelona, among others.

Niki de Saint Phalle

Niki de Saint Phalle's (b. France, 1930 - 2002) exuberant practice emphasized femininity, performance, and collaboration as it rejected notions of the Ione male genius. Saint Phalle is perhaps best known for her sculptures of extravagant, voluptuous feminine forms, which she dubbed "Nanas" and celebrated for her large-scale public works and architectural activations. Her practice included books, prints, films, theater sets, clothing, jewelry, and even perfume. Today, her works are held in the collections of the Courtauld Institute of Art in London, The Museum of Modern Art in New York, the Walker Art Center in Minneapolis, and the Musée d'Art Moderne d'Art Contemporain in Nice, among others.

Arlene Shechet

Arlene Shechet (b. New York, 1951) is a multidisciplinary sculptor living and working in New York City and the Hudson Valley. Highly technical yet entirely intuitive, her work embraces improvisation and seeks to examine the humor and pathos of the lived human experience. Shechet's work is held in many distinguished public collections.

Kiki Smith (b. Germany, 1954) has been known since the 1980s for her multidisciplinary work that explores embodiment and the natural world. She uses a broad variety of materials to continuously expand and evolve a body of work that includes sculpture, printmaking, photography, drawing, and textiles. Smith has been the subject of numerous solo exhibitions worldwide including over 25 museum exhibitions and her work has been featured at five Venice Biennales.
